August Program

Our August program will feature the Wabash, Frisco & Pacific Railroad. From their website, "The WF&P Railway organization was originally formed in 1939, when a group of railway enthusiasts acquired a 12 inch gauge steam locomotive (Engine #171) and the use of a 30-acre estate located on the southeast corner of Brown Road and Natural Bridge. The railway developed to the point, where it had a mile of track, four steam locomotives, a telegraph and a telephone communications system between stations, and an electropneumatic signal system. Trains were operated by regulation timetables, and train orders governed them just as our standard gauge counterparts. Because of rising land values adjacent to Lambert St. Louis Airport, the railway was forced to move, and its last run was conducted on July 19, 1959. After being in storage for two years, we relocated [to] Glencoe, Missouri, in 1961. Since that time, we have laid more than a mile of track, and built numerous buildings, including the car barn in 1976 and the roundhouse in 1992. We are constantly in the process of rebuilding locomotives, cars, expanding track length and maintaining all of the facilities necessary for the operation of the railroad."


Rent the Hencken House

Peek Into Our Past

The *Watchman* county newspaper published news from towns in our area in the late 1800s. Enjoy this month's "Peek Into Our Past."

8/1/1884 – Erich Essen was to have given a picnic in his grove during the past week but we are informed that on account of the rain it was not a success. Erich may himself be disappointed occasionally but he will not disappoint his friends. He intends to try again.

8/9/1889 – Salvador De Mendonca, who was Brazilian Consul General to the United States for the last fifteen years, has recently been appointed Minister to the United States from Brazil. Mr. Mendonca is a brother-in-law of Lorenzo Redman, postmaster at Grover, St. Louis County.

8/23/1889 – The residence of Mr. W. E. Kortkamp, near Allenton, was destroyed by fire last Friday morning. Mr. Kortkamp and his three sons were sleeping in the building, and were awakened by the falling of the roof just in time to escape with their lives. Loss, about \$4,000; insurance, \$2,000.

8/8/1890 – P. P. Lewis, of Crescent, killed a rattlesnake with thirteen rattles last Friday. It was a monster reptile - one of the largest found in the county for many years.

8/18/1893 – Herman Kraus, the butcher of Pond, and John Kesselring, butcher of Orrville, came near having a serious accident. Kraus coming from the east with a cow and Kesselring Brothers coming from the west with a cow where they met at Mr. Albrecht's store. Mr. Kraus jumped out of his cart to lead his horse and cow off the road, but dropped the lines and his horse commenced jumping until he broke the harness and got away from him and jumped over Kesselring's cow, but John had a hold of his cow and there is no getting away what John has a hold of. John got his hand injured and one side of his mustache pulled off. There are no bones broken, but it will give butchers a lesson for the future not to mix up three butchers and two cows.
